NATIONAL FEAST OF LANTERNS 2016

As you may or may not be aware, the Cambrian & Wyvern Region are hosting next year's NFOL. The venue is the Three Counties Showground at Malvern in Worcestershire.

The dates are from 26^{th} August 2016 until 28^{th} August 2016. (August Bank Holiday) Additional nights on Thursday and Sunday are also available to camp. The total cost for five days for two adults will be £72, Children and CCY are free.

The theme for the event is "Movies of the World". This theme was chosen as it gives plenty of scope to get adults and children involved in the mardi gras parade etc.

The location is virtually in the centre of the country and has easy access from the motorway networks. Access to the Three Counties Showground is approximately 20 minutes from Junction 7 of the M5 if you are travelling from the North or from Junction 8 of the M5 if you are travelling from the South

The Cambrian and Wyvern Region have a lot of attractions and is an ideal location to enjoy a holiday with something of interest for everyone. The attractions include The Severn Valley Railway, West Midlands Safari Park, Walks around the Malvern Hills, Gloucester and Worcester cathedrals to name a few. Nearby are the picturesque Cotswold Villages, Cadbury World, the Black Country Museum as well as many Shopping Centres. Within a 2 hour journey the beautiful South and West Wales coastlines are accessible together with the ancient castles of Gwent.





The Wainwright Fells

Back in October 2010 we decided it would be nice to revisit the Lakes; we hadn't been back there since our student days in Manchester and that was quite some time ago! So looking forward to seeing the autumn colours we booked a week at a dog friendly B&B near Keswick where the owner had left some route maps of local fell walks for us to use. We had a wonderful week reminding ourselves of what a beautiful place it was to walk in. The next year we returned and realized that we had actually climbed about 15 of Alfred Wainwright's 214 fells, more or less by accident. Then my son gave me a set of logbooks with all of Wainwright Fells listed page by page and this gave us the urge to climb some more of them.

Since then we have been returning every year. Sometimes we would take our motorhome and stay at the excellent CCC site in Keswick which is a really good location, not only being close to nearby pubs and shops but with a bus station only 5 minutes walk away. Taking a large motorhome along the narrow roads or parking it is just not practical so using the bus allowed us to start at one end of chain of fells and return from the other with no parking worries. Due to the remoteness of some of the fells we used our tent or stayed in cottages and then used the car to reach them. Many of these fells are very memorable because they are tucked away from the popular tourist areas and so rarely visited.

We soon became hooked on trying to walk all 214 fells and armed ourselves with all seven of AWs superb Pictorial Guides to the Lakeland Fells. We also used the OS GetaMap route planning software to plot our routes and load them onto my trusty Garmin GPS. This took a lot of time at home planning routes, where to stay and even where to park. But this paid off as we only rarely lost our way even in thick mist. Although AW describes in great detail every conceivable route up all his fells, we tried to link them by using the ridges to visit as many summits at the same time. Not all of them are huge mountains and some of the smaller ones like Castle Crag in Borrowdale are equally interesting. There is enormous satisfaction in reaching a summit and taking in the stunning views sometimes as far as Scotland or the Isle of Man. As we progressed it was really satisfying to look from one summit and be able to recognise those peaks around us that we'd previously visited.

Of course the weather isn't always perfect up there but I guess there'd be no lakes and tarns without the rain. Living in Southampton we don't have the luxury of being able to spot a good weekend and just set off so we had to make the most of our time there and unless it was pouring down we always set off on our walks. It's well known that the weather is unpredictable in the Lakes and many times we ended up in thick mist, strong winds, hail or driving rain. You do have to be ready for anything and we soon found out that our waterproof gear was not the same thing as Lakeland waterproof!!

On several of the years we arrived in the middle of a heat wave and on occasions delayed our start until the late afternoon because it was just too hot to start climbing. We had some really wonderful evenings with the sun going down, bathing

the scene in golden light and even spotting red deer on our way back.

There were lots of highlights too many to describe here but we do remember staying on a campsite near Coniston and on a beautiful spring day, setting off on the early bus to climb Wetherlam, Swirl How, Great Carrs (with the wreckage of a WW2 bomber on top), Grey Friar, returning via Dow Crag and arriving back in the early evening – missing Libby's afternoon tea by several hours.

On another day we set out in sunny weather to climb a group of fells near Loweswater ending with Mellbreak . We were enjoying the breathtaking views over Crummock water when the sky began to darken around us and within a quarter of an hour we found ourselves having to scamble down a steep gulley in torrential rain and thunder and lightning. Not the best end to a great day.



We completed our final fell Crinkle Crags in August this year. This very memorable occasion was made even better by having our son Nik, Emma and 3 of our grandchildren Ben, Joey and Katie with us! Nik unbeknown to us had carried a bottle of champagne up with him to mark the day in style!

Strangely, a few days later we felt empty having achieved our goal and wondered what next. The answer was obviousthe Coast to Coast walk, but that's another story.
