

Leyburn

Sitting on the northern bank of the River Ure, this charming town rivals nearby Hawes for the title of being the capital of Wensleydale. Despite its sense of importance, the town is far from large, with a population of barely 1,800.

Leyburn is home to the largest auction house outside of London. Tennants Auctioneers on Harmby Road has been running since the late Victorian period and holds more 100 auctions of fine art, antiques and specialists collectable each year. You should also be able to pick up a bargain or two at Leyburn's bustling market every Friday in the town's main square. The square also has a number of regular stores and well as public houses for a relaxing drink or a home cooked meal.

Leyburn is also home to three galleries, the largest and longest established of which is the Wensleydale Galleries. Open seven days a week, it features a number of awe-inspiring paintings and prints from artists known locally and nationally. One of its key collections is entitled 'The Beatles Hidden Gallery' and includes photos taken of the Fab Four by BAFTA winning filmmaker and photographer Paul Berriff.

Overlooking the town is the Leyburn Shawl, an area which covers 1.5 miles and derived its name from a legend that claims Mary Queen of Scots dropped her shawl on the hill while fleeing Bolton Castle which is is about six miles to the west of the Leyburn and is a Scheduled Ancient Monument. The Scottish monarch was imprisoned inside its walls following her army's defeat at the Battle of Langside in 1568 and the bedroom in which she stayed can be visited as well as the castle's dungeon. It is fully open to the public and hosts a number of events including sword fighting demonstrations and falconry displays.

Around seven miles to the south of Leyburn is yet another medieval fortress, Middleham Castle. While much of the castle is now in ruins there is still much to see and the maze of rooms that Richard III once called home can clearly be made out. There is also a fantastic wooden viewing gallery that provides excellent views over Wensleydale's rolling hills. Leyburn has a number of great walking routes, but if you want to give your legs a rest and travel in style then why not hop on a train on the Wensleydale Railway. This heritage line has a station in Leyburn and uses diesel locomotives with the occasional steam services running. Of course, Wensleydale cheese is available.

What's in your bag?

We were out walking on a normal MAS wander from a meet at Beckford, enjoying the countryside and company as always. I was near the front of the crocodile chatting and Annette was at the tail end chatting. We were walking along a path where a field of maize had been harvested when we became aware that we had become fairly well spread out. Then there came a call from the back — Annette has problem. I trotted back to see what was up, and was immediately aware of lots of blood on her leg, running down and colouring her sock a really bright red. The harvesting had left quite long stiff maize stalks, and one had pierced Annette's leg, going in about an inch. I had a big dressing and plasters in my pack, and someone else had antiseptic wipes, so we cleaned and dressed the wound, and Annette and I took a shortcut back to the van. There would be no more walking that weekend, so we went home.

We kept cleaning and dressing the wound once a day but there was no real improvement after three days, so went to the local surgery to see the nurse. She cleaned and dressed the wound again and said to come back after three days, but things still didn't improve much. However, by the third visit a piece of stalk had been partly ejected from the wound, so this was fully extracted and the wound cleaned up again. There was no further problem after that, the wound healed up in good time and is now just a pink scar on the leg.

The moral of the story is that we carry all these bits and pieces in our bags for a good reason. We don't use them often, but when we do, they really are needed and useful. Our thanks go again to all who helped at the scene.

What is Take Five?

The number of incidents of financial fraud more than doubled compared to the same period last year, which suggests a scam occurred every 15 seconds between January and June 2016.

The Take Five campaign led by the Financial Fraud Action UK (FFA) and backed by the police, banking industry and consumer groups, aims to fight the rise of financial fraud by reminding people of the simple things they can do to avoid becoming victims.

Research from the FFA shows that three quarters of people say they are aware of fraudsters' tricks.

But more than a quarter admit they will go against their gut instinct and provide personal details to someone claiming to be from their bank even if they think they shouldn't.

Commonly people said they shared details because the person seemed genuine (43%) while many said they did it because they felt pressured (39%).

Almost four in 10 (38%) said they did it because they were in a rush and wanted to get off the phone quickly.

Nearly a quarter (24%) of victims of financial fraud admitted they fell for a scam because the fraudster was very convincing.

Worryingly, more than a third (37%) of victims could tell they were being scammed during the conversation but still carried on and nearly a quarter (23%) realised after a conversation ended.

Five steps to keep safe


The FFA has provided five simple tips to help you avoid falling victim to financial fraud:

- Never disclose security details, such as your PIN or full password

 it's never right to reveal these details.
- Never assume an email request or caller is genuine people aren't always who they say they are.
- Don't be rushed a bank or genuine organisation won't mind waiting to give you time to stop and think.
- Listen to your instincts if something feels wrong then it is usually right to pause and question what's happening.

 Stay in control have the confidence to refuse unusual requests for information.

I am told that there is an even better view from the top of the Folly but the stairs had no hand-rail and only one very brave (or foolhardy) member made his way to the top. We had passed an information board near the Folly and on closer inspection we found THE ANSWER! Our mystery flower was BATH ASPARAGUS apparently introduced to the area by the Romans (also known as Spiked Star of Bethlehem). We were really lucky to be in this area at just at the right time of year. It goes to show there is always something to learn as well as enjoying being 'Out and About'. Jenny Williams

A Drive Here button has been added to the Event Map and Route Map pages on the Section's website. It uses Google's direction service to plot the


